ABS-CBN Lingkod Kapamilya Foundation, Inc. (ALKFI) is a committed advocate for public service in strategic sectors of Philippine society. ALKFI aims to awaken hope in the Filipino through implementing projects via multisectoral partnerships in the spirit of bayanihan. These are in child care and protection, education, environment, disaster management and community development.

It is the public service arm of ABS-CBN Broadcasting Corporation, one of Asia's biggest media conglomerates. It draws on this relationship to tap into the creativity and reach of media for its various programs. ALKFI serves with the highest standards of excellence, professionalism, integrity and accountability.

Since 1989, ABS-CBN Foundation, Inc. (AFI) has been in the forefront of development programs that uniquely affect strategic sectors in the Philippines—each one with distinct goals and considerable impact. In 1994, AFI pioneered E-media, the production of academic-based educational television (ETV) programs that started with *Sine'skwela*, followed by *Bayani*, *Hiraya Manawari*, *MathTinik*, *Epol Apple*, and *Pahina*. It was in the year of 1997 when *Bantay Bata* (Child Watch) 163 was launched to protect disadvantaged and at-risk children. As AFI envisions a responsibly protected and preserved Philippine environment where children can live safer, healthier and more bountiful lives, it launched *Bantay Kalikasan* (Nature Watch) in 1998. In 2004, *Sagip Kapamilya* was formed in response to a succession of typhoons that left towns damaged and Filipinos in bad need of aid in rebuilding their lives. In 2008, *Bayanijuan* (Country of Juan) was launched to fully utilize the different programs of AFI in rebuilding the

Filipino communities from the ground up which was soon followed by taking the challenge to bring back the beauty and life of Pasig River and its tributaries in 2009, thus the birth of *Kapit Bisig Para sa Ilog Pasig*. In 2012, E-media was then transformed to *Programa Genio* which became the educational arm of ABS-CBN Foundation, Inc. that seeks to empower public school teachers and administrators to transcend the aftermath of calamities and severe environmental conditions so they can likewise empower the disadvantaged child to live in hope and define his own path towards achieving his dreams for himself, his community, and his country.

In 2013, ABS-CBN Foundation has come full circle by taking on the new name ABS-CBN Lingkod Kapamilya Foundation. *Lingkod Kapamilya* is the name of the public service segment from which AFI originated in 1989.



OUR PROGRAMS



BANTAY BATA is a child welfare program launched in 1997 to protect children at risk and are disadvantaged through a nationwide network of social services. It includes the rescue and rehabilitation of sick and abused children, training and advocacy on child abuse detection and prevention, rehabilitation of families in crisis, educational scholarships, supplemental feeding, community and school outreaches, and other child-related activities.



BANTAY KALIKASAN recognizes the important role of conserving the environment in achieving sustainable development. In partnership with various public and private institutions, innovative environmental projects are implemented to address not just symptoms but also root causes of environmental problems.



KAPIT BISIG PARA SA ILOG PASIG will now be a project under Bantay Kalikasan. KBPIP will continue to support the estero rehabilitation efforts of Pasig River Rehabilitation Commission (PRRC) and the management of the historic Paco Market. It will also continue its Information and Education Campaigns (IEC) and volunteer strengthening projects.



SAGIP KAPAMILYA is the emergency humanitarian assistance program of ABS-CBN Lingkod Kapamilya Foundation, Inc. We provide food and non-food relief to affected communities of disasters, as well as engage in rehabilitation and disaster risk reduction projects.



BAYANIJUAN manages Southville 7, the adopted community of ALKFI in Calauan, Laguna. Southville 7 serves as the resettlement site for families who used to live along the esteros of the Pasig River and those who were displaced by Typhoon Ondoy.

In Southville 7, ALKFI forged a partnership with the government, NGOs and other sectors to extend support in education, child protection, livelihood, environment and community development.



PROGRAMA GENIO is the educational advocacy arm of ABS-CBN Lingkod Kapamilya Foundation, Inc. (ALKFI). It seeks to empower public school teachers and administrators to transcend the aftermath of calamities and severe environmental conditions so they can likewise empower the disadvantaged child to live in hope and define his own path towards achieving his dreams for himself, his community, and his country.

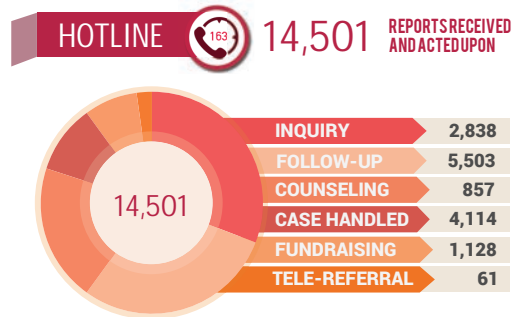

When Bantay Bata started as a child welfare program for children at risk in 1997, it focused on helping children who are physically abused and maltreated. Bantay Bata rescues them from the source of abuse with the ultimate goal of re-integrating the children to their family or nearest of kin. By operating the first child care hotline in the country, Bantay Bata was able to provide access and immediate response to children in crisis. The cases reported to the 163 hotline were handled by trained counsellors and social workers who are always on standby to respond to crisis situations. Children who experienced significant abuse and who cannot be reintegrated with their families were given refuge in the Children's Village where they were provided premium care and underwent counselling and therapy. The hotline also became a medium where children in distress and parents can ask for psychological counselling and legal assistance.

The task of Bantay Bata did not end with ensuring the safety of the children. Bantay Bata's continued assistance with providing aftercare services that include home visits, school visits, and mobilizing resources for the education of rescued and indigent children. Social workers also attend court hearings together with the rescued children.

Parallel to rescuing abused children, Bantay Bata also provided medical assistance to indigent children suffering from simple to complex ailments. Using the power of media as leverage, Bantay Bata effectively narrated the plight of thousands of children with different illnesses to be able to raise funds and facilitate the children's medical treatment. Through the years, it expanded its medical services by conducting medical and dental missions with partner organizations all over the country.

HOTLINE 163

In 2015, Bantay Bata received and acted on 14,501 reports from all over the country in its 163 hotline. The following graph shows the nature of the reports received through the 163 hotline, SMS, web/email, walk-in and telephone (directline) and the action made by Bantay Bata.

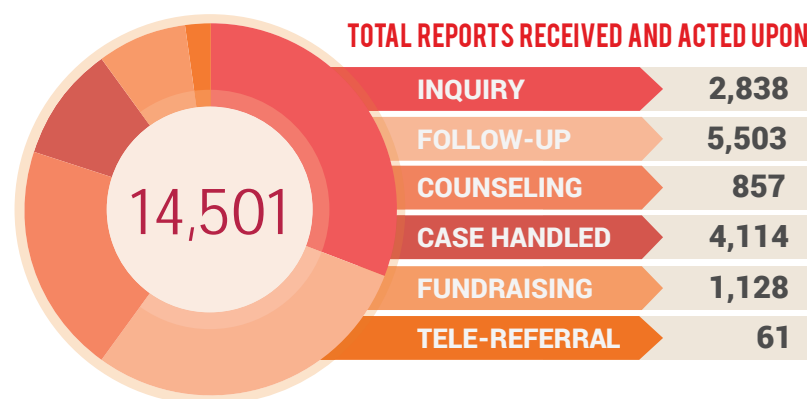
For the last 18 years, Helpline 163 received and acted on a total of 371,617 reports. 1-6-3 is a toll free nationwide helpline and is the only NGO-based helpline that caters to cases related to children at risk.

As Bantay Bata continued to evolve and grow, it continued to utilize its media resource in producing infomercials about children's rights and how to strengthen the family. It broadened its scope of including the community in upholding the rights and welfare of children. Bantay Bata began conducting Community Outreach Programs (COPs), School Outreach Programs, and special events for children and their families. This is to be able to educate parents about children's rights and the community's responsibility in bringing up a child.

After 18 years of protecting the Filipino child, Bantay Bata is again at a point of transition and evolution. With the advent of increasing internet speeds

and ease of access to technology, the battle for child protection has now expanded to online platforms.

Emerging abuses such as cyber bullying, online child abuse and exploitation and child pornography are now very rampant. In a recent meeting sponsored by Child Helpline International in London, the Philippines is one of the countries highlighted as a hotspot for online child abuse in Southeast Asia. With this emerging trend, Bantay Bata aims to once again be one of the pioneering NGOs in the Philippines that collaborate with local and international agencies to battle the rising trend of online child abuse.



MEDICAL ASSISTANCE

THE RESILIENCY OF A CHILD'S HEART

Shelvy was born with a hole in the wall that separates the upper chambers of her heart. The doctor's advised her parents that she needed to undergo an operation for her condition to be treated. However, her parents could not afford the operation at that time because they did not have the capacity to shoulder the expense for the operation. After nine years, Shelvy woke up and complained of chest pain. Her mother brought her to the hospital for a check up and after a series of laboratory tests that include an X-ray, ECG and 2D Echo Test, Shelvy's doctor, Dr. Maruya, advised her mother that she needed an immediate operation to close the hole in her heart. After nine years, Shelvy's parents could still not afford the amount needed for the operation. With the help of Bantay Bata's Advisory Board (BB Adboard), Bantay Bata Davao was able to raise funds so that Shelvy would be able to undergo all the procedures she needs to close the hole in her heart. On October 15, 2015, after six months of medication, Shelvy underwent a procedure called Atrial Septal Defect (ASD) Closure. The operation was successful and Shelvy was assessed to be completely treated from her former condition. Shelvy now enjoys playing physical games, running around their community together with her friends, and extracurricular activities in school all of which was impossible before her operation. Her shortness of breath is gone. She is more active and playful now that she is fully healed. Her dream is to be able to finish her studies and help her family someday.

Shelvy's family would like to express their gratitude to the BB Adboard and Bantay Bata Davao for giving her a second chance at life.

IMPERFORATED NO MORE



When Angeline was born, the doctors discovered that she has no anal opening. She was immediately referred to National Children's Hospital for surgical intervention.

A week later, a Sigmoid Loop Colostomy procedure was done. After the procedure, Angeline's parents were informed that she still needs two (2) more surgical procedures to completely correct her condition. Angeline's father, who is the sole breadwinner, is a security guard and his income is not enough to supply the family's basic needs much more shoulder the future medical expenses of his daughter. When Angeline turned four years old, her parents asked for help from Bantay Bata to bring to the public the condition and need of their daughter. Her case was aired over TFC, ANC and DZMM's Magandang Gabi Doc. Because of your

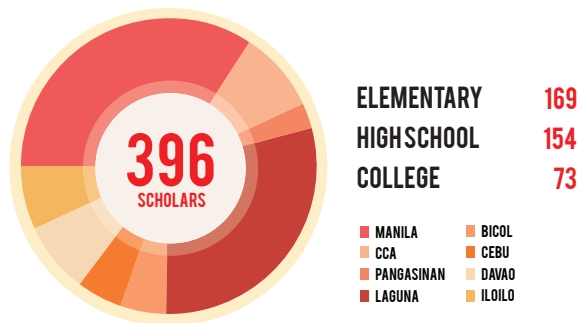
generous donation, Angeline was able to undergo a pullthrough procedure and closure colostomy last June 22 and November 23, 2015 respectively. The amount raised was also able to answer for all the laboratory requirements and medications that she has to take. As of date, Angeline looks healthier and happier and this would not have been possible without the help that you have extended to her.

Shelvy and Angeline are just two of the 5,414 children that Bantay Bata served in 2015. Medical assistance is extended to indigent children aged 0-12 years old from all over the country.

BANTAY EDUKASYON

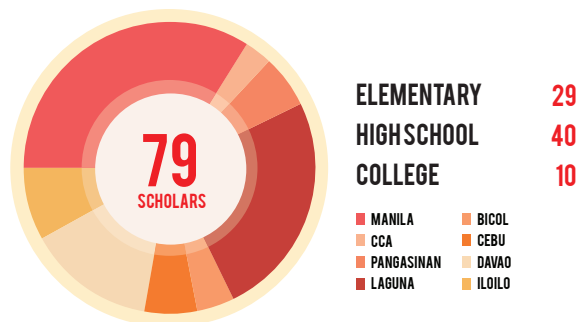

FROM A SICKLY STUDENT TO A STAR SCHOLAR

Annie is one of the beneficiaries of Bantay Kalusugan in Guinobatan East Central School last 2008. She was 10 years old then and a Grade 3 pupil. Annie is the 5th child among 9 children of Aniceto, a tricycle driver and Egliceria, a housewife.



Annie never missed school even though she is sickly and she has no pocket money. Despite poverty she manages to perform very well academically. Her scholarship started in school year 2009-2010 and she was a consistent honours student. At her age, she is aware that finishing her studies is the only way to help her family. She is also a good daughter and a responsible sibling. She helps her mother in the household chores and also assists in taking good care of her younger siblings during school break. There was an instance that she talked with her mother and encouraged her not to get pregnant again because they are already a big family.

Annie graduated elementary with honors and her scholarship continued until high school. In high school, she managed to be under the Science and Engineering Program. She also maintained her high grades, mostly A's (Advanced – 90% and above). During school visits, it was learned that her parents are very supportive and always present in school meetings. Annie also pays her contributions and other school fees on time.

In Bantay Edukasyon meetings, her parents are also always present. They also participate in Bantay Edukasyon related activities and group work activities. Annie and her family is hoping that the scholarship could be extended until college. Annie wants to be a teacher someday.

Among the scholars of Bantay Bata 163 Bicol, Annie is one of the achievers and performs really well in class. She values education that much and she always relay to the social worker that she will do her best to maintain her grades. In almost eight years, her parents also showed some improvements in their parenting. Annie is recommended for continues scholarship to help her fulfill her dreams.

BEDUK-SAGIP COLLABORATION: THE INNATE POTENTIAL OF AN INDIGENOUS PERSON

Charlyne is second to the youngest among eight siblings but because of her determination and sacrifice she was able to enroll in college after she graduated from high school. She went to school without allowance and sometimes she walked long distance going to school just to attend her classes. She took up Nursing Aid but unfortunately she was not able to finish her course because her parents separated. Her older siblings were not able to give assurance of support for Charlyn's studies since they have their own families to support. In 2006, Charlyne decided to marry Arnel Peralta from Lambayong, Sultan Kudarat. They were blessed with one child, Precious Chanelle who is currently in Grade 3. When Precious was still a baby, Charlyne paused and realized how difficult their life is which is dependent on planting and harvesting asparagus plants. She thought that she would not be able to send her daughter to higher education by earning meagerly from selling asparagus which is not even enough to pay for their daily meals.

When Sagip Kapamilya, through Bantay Bata's Bantay Edukasyon, opened its doors to accept scholars from the Indigenous People, Charlyn, whose parents both belong to the B'laan tribe, decided to apply to be able to take up a four year course. She believes that finishing school and having a degree is her weapon to uplift her family poverty and help indigenous people like her. Charlyn was granted the scholarship in 2012 and took up Bachelor of Technical Teacher's Education major in General Education at Villamor Institute of Technology Inc., in General Santos City.

From first year to third year, Charlyne worked on weekdays and reported to school on Saturdays and

Sundays. She was diligent in helping her husband earn by working in asparagus farms earning P300 a week. The knowledge she learned from school, like proper budgeting and spending, she applies at home. In order to manage her household, she needed to be wise in deciding what to buy and how much to save for emergency.

Charlyne excellently performed her role as a mother, wife, worker and student at the same time. She is fortunate to have her husband's full support in her dream of becoming a teacher soon.

Her transformation and improvement as a person is easily noticeable. From being shy and having little confidence as a woman, she has learned to approach people, converse and assert her ideas. She has improved her verbal skills from proper pronunciation, grammar and oral recitation. Her writing skills were tested in her English and Literature classes and she was able to write articles and express her opinions in writing.

Now on her last year in college, Charlyne opted not to work in the asparagus farm. She became a full time student considering that she has field study subjects and thesis. She is currently finishing her hours in field practice at Ireneo National High School in General Santos City. She is excited and proud to say to the donors that her name is listed as a candidate for graduation in her school's March 31, 2016 commencement ceremony.

Because of the scholarship provided by Beduk through the generous donors of Sagip Kapamilya, Charlyne is one step closer to her dream of getting her family out of poverty. Her chosen profession is a fitting one to achieve her desire of cultivating the minds of indigenous children so that they can realize their full potential as members of their tribe and of the society.



SCHOOL ADVOCACY PROGRAM

In 2015, Bantay Bata 163-Hotline visited 13 public schools in Metro Manila to educate 1,190 children about their rights and responsibilities. The activity was also conducted to teach children about the physical signs and behavioral signs of the different types of child abuse. The children were encouraged to communicate with Bantay Bata 163 whenever they see, hear, or experience child abuse.



COMMUNITY OUTREACH PROGRAM

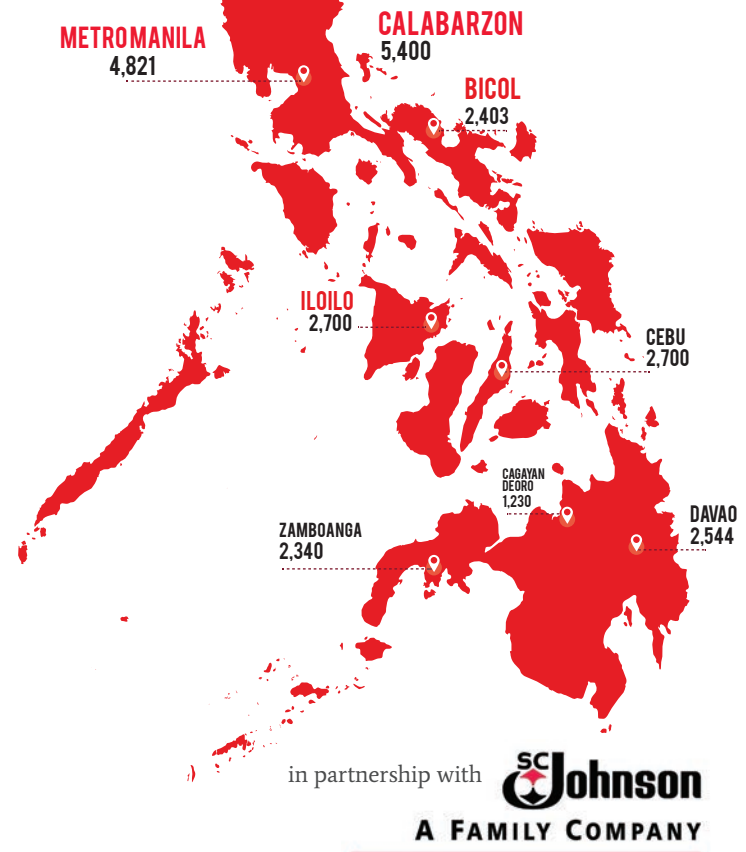


SC Johnson Philippines partnered with Bantay Bata 163 to conduct Community Outreach Projects (COP's) to ten (10) sites nationwide where:

1. High incidence of child abuse is reported, and;
2. Health issues such as mosquito related illnesses are rampant.

COP's are geared towards prevention of child abuse through education and public information. Various activities such as focus group discussions, lectures and games aimed to create awareness on non-violent parenting, children's rights and responsibilities and detection of child abuse are conducted during COP's with its beneficiaries as participants.

Bantay Bata 163 is one of the programs under ABS-CBN Lingkod Kapamilya Foundation, Inc. that addresses holistic development of every Filipino child. It is the only media-based hotline service for children not only in the Philippines, but also in Asia.

Proceeds of Lola, Mommy and Me event will be utilized to broaden the service of hotline from rescuing abused kids into a helpline dedicated to strengthen families. The funds will also be used by Bantay Bata to organize medical and legal services, put forth scholarship programs and revive the Children's Village which houses rescued kids.

PUBLIC PRIVATE PARTNERSHIP: HARMONIZED INTERVENTION FOR CHILDREN-AT-RISK IN VALENZUELA CITY

The City Government of Valenzuela continues to invest on its young generation of residents by upgrading the city's services for children because it believes on the children's potential to become productive citizens of the city. In 2015, the City Government was very keen on enhancing its local institutional service delivery and programs for children and youth. To make this successful and sustainable, the support of all community stakeholders (e.g. parents, guardians, teachers) and local leaders is very crucial. To achieve this success, The City Government of Valenzuela forged a Public Private Partnership with ABS-CBN Lingkod Kapamilya Inc.'s (ALKFI) Bantay Bata 163 (BB 163) program.

Acknowledging the extensive experience and achievements of BB 163 in child protection services and child abuse prevention advocacies, the City Government of Valenzuela agreed to fund BB 163 activities in the city.

The activities are divided into three components:

1) Advocacy campaigns through Community Outreach Projects – this component includes activities that are geared towards increasing awareness of constituents on children's

rights and protection and preventing child abuse incidence through education and public information.

- 2) Harmonization of Valenzuela LGU and Bantay Bata 163 Child Protection Intervention Approaches – activities in this category seeks to increase the effectiveness of child protection efforts within Valenzuela City, the LGU, through its City Social Welfare and Development (CSWD). BB 163 will also assess and design a more streamlined approach to child protection that the city can implement.
- 3) Enhancement of Child Protection Mechanisms at Barangay/Community Level – this component gives focus on the Enhancement of Child Protection at the community level in the City of Valenzuela. This includes capacity building in the Detection and Prevention of Child Abuse in Community and Positive Discipline.

All the activities are geared towards reducing the incidence of child abuse and increasing the CSWD's effectiveness in addressing the situation of children at risk within Valenzuela City. The activities are also expected to increase the effectiveness of city social workers and officials in helping children at risk through a harmonization program that will compliment the common vision of these two parties for a child-friendly city.

As a response to the growing needs of its beneficiaries, Bantay Bata 163 launched the “Barya Mo, Buhay Ko” campaign in October 1997. This serves as a nationwide advocacy and fundraising mechanism using coinbanks to support the cause of the children.

With the generosity and support of various establishments like malls, department stores, supermarkets, pharmacies, pawnshops, banks and kind-hearted individuals, Bantay Bata 163 is able to provide assistance for disadvantaged children all over the country.

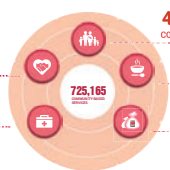

In 2015, Bantay Kalikasan's (BK) term as the steward and project manager for the La Mesa Nature Reserve

will be on it second to the last year. BK's Management Contract forged with its partners – Metropolitan Waterworks and Sewerage System (MWSS), Manila Water, Maynilad and the Quezon City Local Government Unit (QC LGU) will expire in 2016. Bantay Kalikasan plans to bid for the renewal of the Management of the nature reserve because ALKFI believes on the utmost importance of continuing the protection and rehabilitation of the major source of drinking water for the people of Metro Manila. One of the major achievements of BK in the La Mesa Watershed Project is the development of the 33-hectare La Mesa Ecopark that served a two-fold purpose – to create awareness among the general public on the importance of preserving

the natural watershed ecosystem by providing avenues for nature appreciation, learning and recreation and to generate funds to sustain the continuous rehabilitation and maintenance of the watershed.

The Green Initiative (GI) is the project launched by BK in 2013 to realize its mission of establishing eco-friendly communities whose people are advocates for protecting and taking care of the environment. To achieve its mission, BK partnered with government agencies, the academe civic organizations and non-government organizations that believe that the same outcome is achievable and possible. In 2015, Green Initiative is present in 30 municipalities in 11 provinces all over the country.

The Bantay Baterya and Bantay Langis Campaign engages and encourages partner companies to donate their used batteries and used oil, helping them to handle and dispose properly these hazardous wastes that are very harmful to the environment. The funds generated from the recycling and recovery of

the used batteries and oil is used to support the environmental projects of Bantay Kalikasan. In 2015, Bantay Baterya and Bantay Langis were able to generate PHP 10.8 Million that was used to implement interventions in La Mesa Watershed, Green Initiative and Puno ng Buhay projects.

Puno ng Buhay Program (PnB) is a countrywide tree planting and crop growing program launched in July 9, 2015. It is for the benefit of the environment, the communities and the country in general. It is a community-based, enterprise-based and science-based project which involves agro-forestry, agronomic or cash crop as well as tree species on different project sites in different parts of the country. Through collaboration with different government agencies, private entities and civil society organizations, PnB aims to raise awareness and espouse advocacy among private organizations and individuals, utilize the media for publicity in order to garner support from different sectors, create model forest communities; and provide marketing and infrastructure support to sustain the project sites. PnB piloted its program framework in six sites located in Antipolo, Batangas, Mindoro, Samar, Leyte and North Cotabato.

GREEN INITIATIVE

BK - GI AND PACMAN PARTNERSHIP FIGHTING POVERTY IN SARANGGANI

In 2015, Hon. Emmanuel “Manny” Pacquiao donated PHP 5 Million to Bantay Kalikasan’s Green Initiative Project to help the indigent tribes of Saranggani. ALKFI introduced six interventions in three municipalities of Saranggani that has a direct impact on the lives of about 5,300 people that mostly belong to Indigenous People’s (IP) groups.

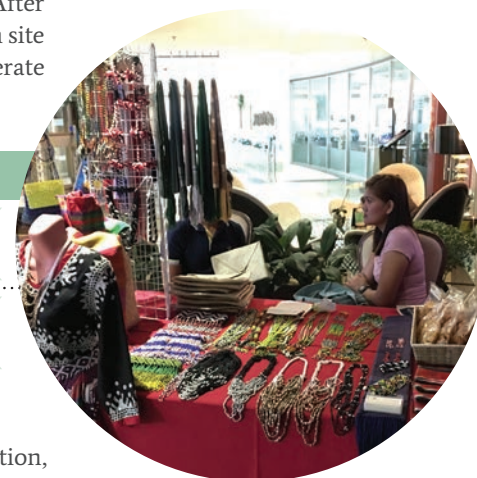

B. INCREASE IN ANNUAL GROSS INCOME

Before Green Initiative's interventions, the only major attraction that the People's Organization in New La Union can offer is White Water Tubing that generates an annual gross income of at least Php 50,000.00. After partnering and working together with Green Initiative (GI), the number of major attractions in the tourism site increased by at least five new activities. This is aside from the catering, cottages and events that also generate income for the people. Last 2015, the association registered an annual gross income of Php 1,300,000.00.

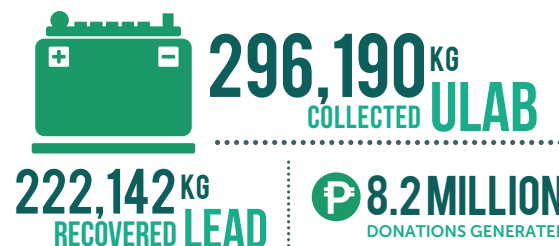

BANTAY BATERYA



Bantay Baterya continues its drive to collect used lead-acid batteries for recycling. To achieve this, Bantay Baterya formed a tripartite agreement with the Environment Management Bureau of the Department of Natural Resources (EMB-DENR) and Oriental and Motolite Marketing Corporation (OMMC). EMB-DENR provides the necessary permits for BK to transport Used Lead Acid Batteries (ULABs) while OMMC helps in the recycling and transportation of the collected ULABs. OMMC also buys the recovered lead from the ULABs to make new batteries. OMMC markets the Motolite battery line in the country.

In 2015, Bantay Baterya forged new partnerships with Business Process Outsourcing (BPO) companies and banks to be able to expand their advocacy of responsible toxic waste disposal.

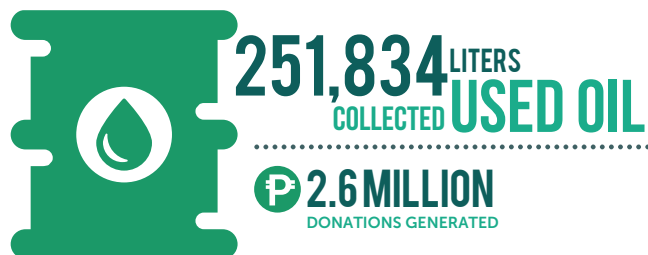

BANTAY LANGIS

Like the Used Lead Acid Batteries (ULABs), used industrial oil that is not properly disposed or recycled can wreck havoc to the environment and to people. Used oil can work its way to water ways or ground water which can result to pollution and contamination. Water mixed with used oil will not be productive when used for farming for 100 years. Used oil that is not handled properly and with regular exposure without proper protection is proven to cause cancer.

Bantay Langis focuses on the collection of industrial oil that is for disposal. It has a tripartite agreement with EMB-DENR that helps in the documentary requirements to allow the transportation and treatment of used oil and Genetron International Marketing that helps in treating and recycling the collected used oil.

ADVOCACY

The Advocacy Unit of Bantay Kalikasan (BK-AU) is in charge of networking and developing strategic partnerships with organizations that have the same goals and stand as Bantay Kalikasan in environmental issues. The main activities of BK-AU includes the creation of a network of like – minded eco tourism practitioners, the integration of climate change adaptation and disaster risk reduction management (DRRM) in BK activities and projects, and conducting evidence-based campaign and policy advocacy in Anti – Mining.

In 2015, the Advocacy Unit has 402 members in its network of ecotourism practitioners. The network members came from various sectors (i.e. LGU, NGOs and Relevant Government Agencies). BK-AU also lead the Climate Change and DRRM trainings for BK staff as the first step in integrating these concepts to BK projects and activities. For its Anti-Mining Advocacy, BK-AU, in partnership with three state universities and colleges, completed the Total Economic Valuation Study as an evidenced-based study on the effects of mining in three areas – Mindoro, Palawan and Bicol.

LA MESA WATERSHED

Before Bantay Kalikasan was assigned as the Project Manager for La Mesa Watershed in 1999, the forest in the La Mesa area was 75% denuded with over 2,500 illegal settler families living near the watershed. These families engage in slash-and-burn farming and illegal logging that aggravated the condition of the watershed. There were only nine species of trees which are all exotic and only 25 species of birds were living or spotted in the area. After 16 years, only around 200 hectares of the 1,750 –hectare that can be planted is for reforestation. The reforestation program introduced 100 endemic tree species to the nature reserve. Reforestation of the 1,552 hectares was completed in 2010 and since then that reforested area was maintained through enrichment planting and establishment of protection protocols. The transformation of La Mesa from a denuded into a verdant forest has increased the number of bird species living and visiting the area from 20 to 125. Findings from the independent impact study conducted on La Mesa also indicated an increase in the flora and fauna species living in the reserve. The quality of water which was once threatened is now at Grade A which means that it is a viable source of drinking water. The Watershed has also become a laboratory for biodiversity and ecology studies as well as a famous biking trail for sports enthusiasts.

LA MESA ECOPARK

Sixteen years ago, the location of the Ecopark was teemed with informal settlers that contributed to the continuous destruction of the forest and pollution of the watershed. Today, the park is teeming with visitors and tourists who have come to appreciate the beauty of nature. They also come because they are provided with opportunities to learn more about the importance of conserving and protecting the environment. The Ecopark also offers services that teach the advent of climate change and how the forests help mitigate its effects. With the help of donors and partners, BK was able to transform the 33-hectare land into a natural park with an eco-academy facility. The abandoned facilities were rehabilitated and new facilities and eco-friendly attractions were introduced. This was to facilitate recreational activities and increase awareness about the beauty and importance of forests and nature as a whole. In 2015, the Ecopark recorded the highest number of visitors since it became operational at 437,324 visitors. This generated PHP 35.8 Million (also the highest since 2005) in donations. The donations were utilized in the maintenance and protection of the watershed and the operations of the Ecopark. The park has been also dubbed as the “Pre Nuptial Capital of Quezon City” with many prospective couples choosing it as a venue for their pre-wedding photo and video activities.

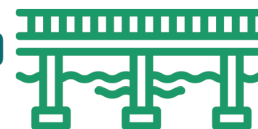

KAPIT BISIG PARA SA ILOG PASIG

Kapit Bisig Para sa Ilog Pasig (KBPIP) focused on collaborating with corporate groups, like-minded organizations and the community to maintain the cleanliness of the waterways and the esteros. KBPIP intensified its Information and Education Campaign Programs (IEC) to educate the communities around the waterways about Solid Waste Management and proper stewardship to keep the esteros clean and vibrant. It spearheaded the Linear Park Development of Estero de Pandacan in partnership with GT Metro Foundation that included the relocation of 441 Informal Settler Families (ISFs).

In 2015, the challenge for Kapit Bisig Para sa Ilog Pasig (KBPIP) was to maintain the fruits of the efforts it has invested since 2009.

Taking on the challenge of maintaining the cleanliness of the esteros and preserving the space of the easement areas recovered, KBPIP enjoyed a banner year in terms of partnerships and strengthening of its Information and Education Campaign for the community along the waterways to achieve this goal. In April 2015, the United States Ambassador to the Philippines and the U.S. Embassy employees celebrated Earth Day by doing a cleanup drive in KBPIP managed esteros and staged a concert to create awareness on the importance of taking care of our planet. KBPIP also partnered with JPMorgan Chase & Co. (JPMCC), P&A Grant Thornton and Accenture in conducting cleanups and doing community immersion activities to maintain the cleanliness of the esteros.

As a component of its Solid Waste Program, KBPIP organized a children's pageant that engaged children, parents and barangay officials in 10 barangays near the waterways in learning activities that pushed for increased awareness about solid waste management and practice of waste segregation. In partnership with GT Metro

Foundation, KBPIP was able to transform the barren easement in Estero de Pandacan into a lush and beautiful park.

A livelihood center was also inaugurated in the community near the rehabilitated easement where residents can take free courses to gain livelihood skills. In the process of developing the linear parks, KBPIP, in partnership with government agencies like the Pasig River Rehabilitation Commission (PRRC), National Housing Authority (NHA), Metro Manila Development Authority (MMDA), Department of Public Works and Highways (DPWH), and the Manila Local Government Unit was able to relocate 441 informal settler families from Estero de Pandacan to a resettlement area with a better home and potentially a better quality of life.

KBPIP also continues to develop the capability and capacity of its volunteer group – the River Warriors. The River Warriors are community based volunteers that made a commitment to safeguard the Pasig River. Aside from livelihood skills, the River Warriors were taught how to effectively communicate to the community, especially the children, the importance of keeping the waterways clean.

AMBASSADORS OF THE PLANET: U.S. EMBASSY CELEBRATES EARTH DAY WITH KBPIP AND PANDACAN RESIDENTS

The usual mundane afternoon in Pandacan turned into a lively day as volunteers from Youth Southeast Asian Leaders Initiative (YSEALI), a group composed of young Filipinos and Americans, cleaned Estero de Pandacan. This activity is borne out of the collaboration of ABS-CBN Lingkod Kapamilya Foundation, Inc. (ALKFI) and the U.S. Embassy. The two institutions partnered for the very first time to clean the stretch of the estero in Brgy. 841. Some of the volunteers painted trash bins to be installed in different areas, while others attended a workshop on how to create bokashi balls.

Bokashi, or fermented balls are created by mixing organic material and beneficial microorganisms. Bokashi balls will then be dropped into the estero and will dissolve after a couple of months. Microorganisms will then filter the harmful bacteria in the estero. This allows the community to directly participate in restoring the life of the river.

U.S. Ambassador Philip Goldberg joined the volunteers including the embassy staff during clean-up. He expressed that U.S. Embassy will contribute towards creating awareness about the environment especially the Pasig River.

“Damaging the environment is also damaging the livelihood, the food chain and all of the things that we need. That is why this clean-up is so important... I’d like to see more of these kinds of clean-up efforts to draw awareness,” Ambassador Goldberg said.

ALKFI Chairperson Gina Lopez provided a descriptive presentation of how the entire Pasig River system works, that the river can only be truly rehabilitated if it will be cleaned at source.

“Cleaning the Pasig River is the blooming of our future. It gives the clear message that if we work together, miracles can happen,” she expressed.

The event energetically concluded with a concert that featured ABS-CBN talents Mitoy Yonting and Jovit Baldovino. Audience went wilder when Bumblefoot and Pinoy rock legend Razorback set the stage on fire with unbelievable guitar chords and a playlist of heavy metal songs.



JOINING THE PHILANTHROPIC MOVEMENT: JPMORGAN CHASE & CO. EMPLOYEES' ESTERO COMMUNITY IMMERSION PROGRAM

In 2015, JPMorgan Chase & Co. in partnership with KPBIP conducted three community immersions in the communities near Estero de Paco, Estero de Concordia, and Estero de Santibañez. 150 JPMorgan Chase & Co. employees volunteered to spend their weekends organizing games, conducting story telling sessions, distributing school supplies and administering feeding sessions, repainting of daycare center and refurbishment of daycare library for the children in the community. A total of 190 children benefitted from the employees' efforts. Aside from providing fun through games and nutritious food through the feeding program, the activities aimed to make the children become aware of the importance of the esteros. The children were also taught how to maintain the cleanliness of the waterways.

JPMorgan Chase & Co. is the pilot partner of ABS-CBN Lingkod Kapamilya Inc. (ALKFI) in its Employee Engagement Activities (EEA) wherein employees of corporate institutions are encouraged to immerse themselves in ALKFI beneficiary communities and programs.



MUNTING MUTYA 2015 TEACHES KIDS TO CARE FOR THE ENVIRONMENT

The Search for Munting Mutya ng Estero 2015 of Kapit Bisig Para sa Ilog Pasig was more than just a beauty pageant. It aimed to educate the children and the community on how to care for the environment by teaching them proper waste management that starts from their homes.

Held in Paco Market's activity area, 10 young girls from the different barangays near Estero de Paco, competed for the crown.

According to Jonald Balgos, the Area Manager of Estero de Paco, instead of selling tickets, the candidates collected recyclable materials as their entry to the competition. The monetary value of the recyclables will be used to fund the Material Recovery Facility of KBPIP in Paco, Manila. Aside from helping fund the MRF, the collected recyclables is also 50% of their final score. "Based on our final assessment and meeting with the parents, we found out that the community complied with this rule. They segregated their wastes and those recyclables they were able to collect were given to the candidate of their barangay to show their support." During the contest, the questions given to the contestants were about on how they can take care of the environment in their own little ways.

It has been the mission of KBPIP to rehabilitate Metro Manila's waterways by focusing on the esteros connected to the Pasig River. In order to do the daunting task to rehabilitate 48 esteros, KBPIP works together with different sectors and of course, with the community. Teaching the people on ground how to segregate and the proper waste management has been one of their ways in sustaining the rehabilitated esteros. To date, there are already 17 rehabilitated esteros including the Estero de Paco.

Princess Moncera, 7 years old, the grandwinner, shares how she takes care of the environment, "Hindi po ako magtatapon ng basura kung saan-saan po at saka po sasabihin ko po sa mga bata 'wag po sila magtapon kung saan-saan. Doon po sa tamang basurahan."

Erick Listana the Communications Division Officer of STI muses, "As an academic institution, STI believes that giving opportunity by the use of scholarship programs is a part of our social responsibility. It is also to support ABS-CBN Lingkod Kapamilya Foundation and the people that they are helping. It is a challenge to sustain the projects or programs being implemented. We hope these kids will continue what has been started by Kapit Bisig Para sa Ilog Pasig in this contest and may they be the role models for us to have a cleaner environment."

SERVICE WITH VALUE: P&A GRANT THORTON HELPS IN CLEANING ESTERO DE PANDACAN



With the goal of initiating change one step at a time, P&A Grant Thornton conducted a clean-up activity at Estero de Pandacan in partnership with Kapit Bisig Para sa Ilog Pasig.

Close to 150 employee-volunteers of P&A Grant Thornton were grouped into four to scoop trash floating on the estero, clean the easement, create Bokashi balls, and build trash bins that would be placed in the community. Each of them was also given Bokashi balls that they threw to the estero. Bokashi means “fermented organic matter”. It is a system developed in Japan that uses beneficial micro-organisms that helps in breaking down toxins in the water.

With the immersion, the employee-volunteers were able to experience firsthand the feeling that there is hope in cleaning the esteros. The small step that they took, coupled with the steps taken by other like-minded organizations, can initiate the change that is needed to clean the waterways and ultimately the Pasig River.



CLEANING TO CREATE A DIFFERENCE: THE NATIONAL CLEANUP DAY

On September 20, 2015, close to 250 volunteers gathered to clean and create a difference in Estero de Pandacan for the National Clean-up Day. It wasn't an easy task to rehabilitate the estero, but the volunteers did not hesitate to help even in their own little ways. The story of rehabilitating Estero de Pandacan might still be a long way ahead of us but with working together, KBPIP and its partners believe that the Ilog Pasig will be back to life again.

GREAT TRANSFORMATION FOR THE INHABITANTS OF ESTERO DE PANDACAN

GT Foundation Inc. (GTFI), the sister foundation of Metrobank Foundation that donated island reactors in Estero de Paco, partnered with KBPIP to develop the 100-meter long linear park in Estero de Pandacan and built a livelihood center for the community along the estero. The linear park and the livelihood center were inaugurated last November 27, 2015. The inauguration was attended by GTFI Executive Director Aniceto Sobrepeña, ALKFI and PRRC Chairperson Gina Lopez and Manila Mayor Joseph Estrada.

The linear park development was the final stage in transforming the area from environment and people threatening to an eco and people-friendly park. The partnership between GTFI and KBPIP has made this transformation possible that is beneficial not only to the community near it but to the thousands that traverse the area every day.

RIVER WARRIORS AND COMMUNITY ORGANIZERS: TELLING STORIES BETTER

Sydney Legaspina is one of the volunteer River Warriors of ABS-CBN Lingkod Kapamilya Foundation, Inc. – Kapit Bisig Para Sa Ilog Pasig (ALKFI-KBPIP). When he was young, he said storytelling was not a part of their family traditions but he was surrounded with so many kids -- his siblings and cousins.

On November 14, 2015, Sydney, together with 26 people composed of River Warriors and Community Organizers of ALKFI-KBPIP, gathered to attend a storytelling workshop facilitated by a renowned theater actor Luisito “Kuya Bodjie” Pascua.

Storytelling is a part of a river warrior and a community organizer’s journey in the

community. During afternoons, river warriors like Sydney hold a free storytelling activity with the children who are living in the communities near the rehabilitated esteros. By telling children’s stories which talk about the environment, KBPIP aims to teach children on how they can help in maintaining the cleanliness of their surroundings especially since they are living near the waterways.

Sydney shares, “Hindi pala basta-basta ganun lang (ang pag i-storytelling). Kailangan makuha mo yung atensyon ng mga bata, tapos dapat, maituro mo talaga sa kanila kung ano yung kinukwento mo. Natutuhan ko kung ano yung tamang paraan ng pagku-kuwento kaya siguro, mas marami akong matuturuang bata.”

After the workshop, Kuya Bodjie hoped that all of the participants will have the desire to tell stories and have the desire to tell them well.

In 2015, KBPIP has a total of 526 trained River Warriors. Aside from helping the River Warriors improve their capacity to communicate the importance of clean and garbage free tributaries, ALKFI, together with partner individuals and institutions are helping these volunteers to be equipped with livelihood skills. The River Warriors are regularly seen catering events and trainings organized by ALKFI and other organizations in the metro.

SAGIP KAPAMILYA

Aside from continuing efforts to help build back better the lives of the survivors of Typhoon Yolanda, Sagip Kapamilya strengthened its relief operations capability by partnering with local business institutions to be able to strategically pre-position relief goods in areas where they can be immediately delivered and served to the people affected by a calamity or a disaster. It also visited areas previously affected by major calamities (e.g. Ondoy, Pablo, Maring) and continued to extend help by building classrooms, starting up livelihood projects and building systems that would enable communities to have access to potable water.

Sagip Kapamilya is always ready to immediately respond and give aid during calamities. It is also the top of mind of Filipinos when it comes to giving assistance during fires, floods and natural disasters.

In 2015, Sagip Kapamilya continued to help build back better the lives of our Kapamilyas who were affected by Typhoon Yolanda (Haiyan).

Originally assigned as the development sponsor for the municipalities of Basey, Marabut and Sta. Rita in Samar and Dulag in Leyte, Sagip Kapamilya, together with its sister programs, Programa Genio (PG) and Bantay Kalikasan (BK), expanded its area of coverage to include other towns in Samar and Leyte and the provinces of Iloilo and Palawan. From its repertoire of soft educational programs that were started in 2014, Program Genio introduced the Assessment of Diverse Learners in 2015. This assessment aims to formally determine the actual skills and levels of students from Grade 3 to Grade 6. The results

of the study will be the basis for developing the corresponding intervention or enrichment programs for students in various ability groups. Starting with the development of the Sohoton Caves as its pilot ecotourism project in 2014, Bantay Kalikasan has expanded its ecotourism programs that include, among others, a Mangrove Ecotour that features a floating restaurant and firefly watching as well as a skim boarding camp in San Juan, Leyte, a Surf Camp in Dulag, Leyte and a local culture immersion in Saob Cave and Beach in Basey, Samar. BK also continued to help its farmer beneficiaries in Barangay San Jose, Dulag Leyte by expanding the existing organic vegetable farm to include a piggery and a poultry

component. In Marabut, Samar, assistance was extended to the local People's Organization to develop an organic farm - to - table concept restaurant. Aside from revenue generation, the establishment of the local farms ensure that the beneficiaries have a sustainable source of nutritious and organic food. For the fishermen beneficiaries in Marabut, construction of a fish processing plant was commenced in 2015 and is expected to be finished and fully operational in 2016. In partnership with Honda Philippines, BK was also able to extend help in the transportation stakeholders in Basey, Samar by donating six motorcycles that were converted into habal-habal which is a local form of transportation.





As of December 2015, a total of 127 classrooms in 42 schools sites have been repaired and built in partnership with the Armed Forces of the Philippines and Energy Development Corporation. The classrooms will benefit about 9,000 students and 300 teachers. Educational Soft Programs implemented by Programa Genio, was able to help 9,561 students and 306 teachers in 24 schools in Samar, Leyte, Iloilo and Palawan. BK's livelihood projects are now helping 38 People's Organizations and is directly benefitting 42, 480 individuals.

From 2013 to 2015, Sagip Kapamilya was able to serve an estimated 3.9 Million or about 24% of the total number of people affected by Typhoon Yolanda.

Aside from its Yolanda Rehabilitation efforts, Sagip Kapamilya, continued its relief operations by serving the victims of calamities, both natural and man-made. A total of 87,885 individuals were served for Typhoon Lando covering the provinces of 65,880 individuals for Typhoon Nona, and 47,650 individuals for fire incidents in different cities in Metro Manila.

Sagip Kapamilya's rehabilitation programs for 2015 includes the construction of 16 classrooms for victims of Typhoon Ondoy and Habagat, a School-Based Bakery project in 10 school sites in Luzon and Mindanao, distribution of 37 fishing boats in Bayug Island, Iligan City and Baler, Aurora, Alternative Learning School-Skills Training, distribution of farm seeds for victims of Typhoon Lando, Feeding Programs, and provision of potable water system in Sitio Caguisikan, Oriental Mindoro and Brgy. Ditumabo, San Luis, Aurora.

PACK YOUR BAGS, WE'RE LEAVING

Traveling leads you to places with different culture, seeing and meeting different faces. But the best experience might be, is when you travel and you also get to help someone else.

Felix Assouly felt the urge to travel when he was 18 while Marie Alaman started to wander at the age of 20. They've been to Cambodia, Vietnam, Malaysia, China, Portugal, Spain, and Italy, just to name a few in Asia and Europe.

Some of these places, these French travel buddies do not just enjoy the different tourist spots in the country but they also leave something significant – the spirit of volunteerism.

Marie remembers, she was 17 and she was in Dominican Republic when she saw what poverty is.

The second time she went to another country, Cambodia, she volunteered to take care of the children during summer for them to avoid lurking on the streets.

Whenever he does volunteer works, Felix feels that he earns more than what he gives. "I learn a lot and I think volunteering is giving what you can give." What interests him more is the things he learn from everyone he meet. From their political views to religion and to how people live in one country.

And all the way from Paris, Marie and Felix took another chance to visit the Philippines. During their first visit, they were not able to accomplish volunteer works. Guess visiting the Pearl of the Orient for the second time is a charm. They signed up as volunteers in Sagip Kapamilya – the Emergency Humanitarian Assistance program of ABS-CBN Lingkod Kapamilya Foundation. Inside the warehouse in Examiner Street, together with other SK Volunteers from Caloocan City, they repacked relief goods for Lando victims.

"The people we met while traveling, were very kind, nice, and helpful. So if we can do something to show how thankful we are to the people in the Philippines, we will, even if it's just for one day," Marie shares. "If a lot of people do it (volunteering) at the end, it could be a big stuff," she adds.

As a parting quote, they said, Travel while you are young and able. Maybe, we can also say, Travel and help as long as you are able.

"I learn a lot and I think volunteering is giving what you can give."

REHABILITATION EFFORTS

POTABLE WATER FOR SITIO CAGUISIKAN

Access to potable water is one of the problems in remote areas just like in Sitio Caguisikan, Brgy. Gutad of Calapan, Oriental Mindoro.

For the past 20 years, families in Sitio Caguisikan have to walk 7 kilometers just to fetch drinking water for their daily needs.

Recently, Sagip Kapamilya of ABS-CBN Lingkod Kapamilya Foundation, Inc., turned over a water facility in Caguisikan Elementary School where in 1,482 families will benefit from the project. Sagip provided the material and labor for its installation.

Caguisikan ES is also a beneficiary of ALKFI-SK's "Gusto Kong Mag-aral Project" as they have been given two classrooms last July. The classroom buildings were done through Sagip Kapamilya's partnership with Philippine Army 203rd Brigade and Engineering Construction Battalion of Calapan. 145 students are also beneficiaries of a feeding program called "Sagip Kalusugan" that runs for 120 days.

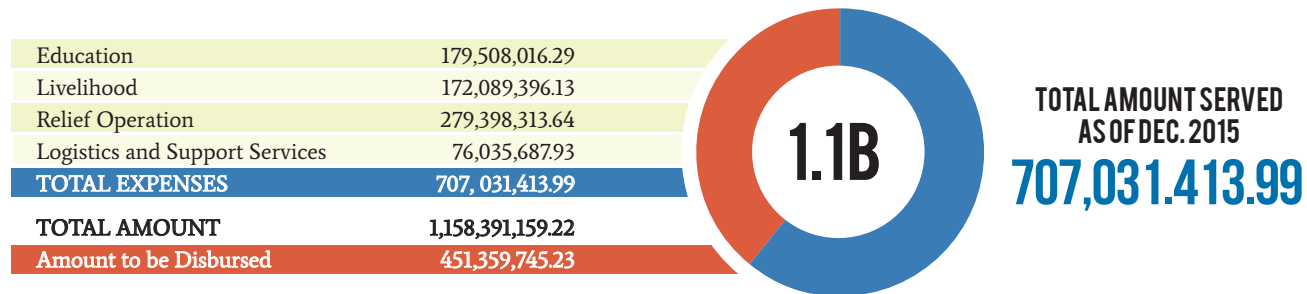
When Typhoon Lando hit the province of Aurora, Brgy. Ditumabo of the municipality of San Luis, Aurora was one of the affected areas. The pipes of its primary source of potable water for 900 families were flushed away by the typhoon. This was also the source of water for their backyard gardens. To help, Sagip Kapamilya provided 25 rolls of 75 mm x 60 mm pipes to replace the flushed ones.



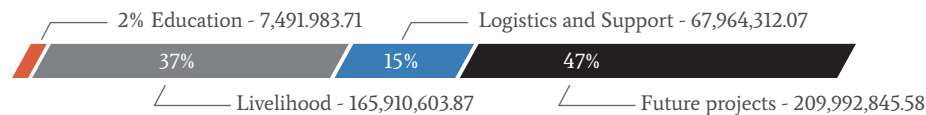
With the spirit of bayanihan, the residents worked together to fix the water source and ensure that the water will flow again and reach everyone in the community.

UTILIZATION OF SAGIP KAPAMILYA'S YOLANDA DONATIONS

The initial funds received amounting to PHP 609M were utilized to provide immediate relief to the victims and initiate the first phase of rehabilitation projects. Of the PHP 451M remaining cash, PHP 241 Million is already allocated for projects until the end of 2016. The remaining PHP 210 Million which only came in 2014 to 2016 will be utilized for projects for 2017 until 2018.

CLASSROOM BUILD

Heeding the call to build back better and stronger infrastructures, Sagip Kapamilya partnered with Energy Development Corporation (EDC) to help design and manage the construction of disaster resilient classrooms. With the thought that the Philippines is a typhoon prone country and at the same time located within the Pacific Ring of Fire which means that it is also prone to earthquakes, EDC came up with a design that can withstand winds of up to 250 kilometers per hour and a 7.2 magnitude earthquake. The partnership with EDC has led to the completion of 79 classrooms mostly in the Samar and Leyte area.

The Armed Forces of the Philippines (AFP) has been a strong partner of Sagip Kapamilya in relief and rehabilitation efforts especially in isolated and far flung areas. In 2015, AFP partnered with Sagip in constructing classrooms by assisting in the transportation of the construction materials as well as in providing the engineers and manpower to build the schools. The partnership with AFP has led to the building of 40 classrooms which are mostly located in hard to reach islands and communities.

Initial outcomes documented indicate that the construction of the classrooms significantly helped the children move on from their traumatic experience. The new classrooms enabled the children to establish a sense of normalcy and allowed them to have a conducive environment for learning. The typhoon resilient classrooms are also perceived by the children as safe havens in case another typhoon will come. This perception helps in reducing the anxiety and fear among the children during bad weather conditions.

EDUCATIONAL SOFT PROGRAMS

In 2015, Programa Genio directed its energies and utilized Sagip Kapamilya funds in servicing Sagip Kapamilya beneficiary schools in Busuanga, Palawan. Programa Genio provided soft educational programs for nine schools benefitting 2,626 students and 96 teachers.

Teacher Training

Long bereft of training opportunities and regular updates in the changes in the teaching pedagogy, the teachers underwent four training sessions that covered the following:

- Mathematics and Science Teaching Strategies
- Universal Kindergarten
- Effective Reading Instruction and
- Essentials of Grammar and Comprehension

The training sessions were a big boost not only to the knowledge but also to the morale of the teacher participants. The trainings gave them confidence and inspiration to be better teachers and facilitators of learning.

Library Development

During the needs assessment phase, one of the findings of Programa Genio is the lack of resource and reading materials in the Busuanga schools. Because of this, and as a complimentary intervention to their DEAR (Drop Everything and Read) Program, PG upgraded the library of the nine beneficiary schools.

At the end of the school year, an assessment was conducted using the Philippine Informal Reading Inventory. Out of the 1, 704 students that were assessed, the number of non-English readers was reduced from 44 students at the beginning to 15 students at the end of the school year. Also, the number of non-readers in Filipino was reduced from 20 students to nine students.

THE HEALING POWER OF **MUSIC**

Kewa Rondero is a Grade 2 student in New Busuanga Elementary School. His teacher observed that although Kewa shows no interest in his academic subjects, he showed skill and excellent rhythm in playing makeshift drums made of tin cans. Because of this, the teacher asked and supported Kewa in joining the drum and lyre ensemble of their school. Upon joining the ensemble, the teacher noticed that Kewa is really talented in playing the drums. Furthermore, the teacher shared that Kewa showed determination in coming to class and that he began to show interest in his academic subjects. During the latter part of the school year, the teacher reported that Kewa has shown improvements not only in his drum playing but more significantly in his academic performance. The teacher surmised that allowing Kewa to express his creative side though drum playing has also coaxed out his intellectual side as he became more curious in learning not only drum skills but academic concepts also.

Kewa is just one of the students who benefitted from Programa Genio and Sagip Kapamilya's donation of Drum and Lyre sets in Busuanga schools as part of Healing Through the Arts Program. The intervention aims to help the students express and develop their artistic and musical talents as a way of healing from their traumatic experience.

The educational interventions we have placed in the nine schools have also helped them achieve the highest average National Achievement Test (NAT) rating in the past three school years.

The increase in the NAT scores is a testament that our interventions are working and that the investment we have poured in the soft education programs are worth it. The increase for this year is minimal but we are in the right direction.

LIVELIHOOD

In 2015, Bantay Kalikasan (BK) expanded its presence and interventions in the Yolanda affected areas by helping organize more People's Organizations that will manage business start-ups particularly in ecotourism. Interventions in agriculture, fishing and tikog weaving that were introduced in 2014 were strengthened and expanded as well. BK also ventured into helping stakeholders in the transportation sector in Basey, Samar.

At the end of 2015, BK was able to organize and assist 38 People's Organizations and directly serve about 42,480 individuals through its livelihood projects.

If the classrooms built are the physical body of our education interventions, the educational soft programs are its heart and soul.

Programa Genio (PG) was tapped by Sagip Kapamilya to complement its school building efforts with educational soft programs. These educational soft programs were designed to help students improve their reading skills and to develop love for reading. Also, these interventions were intended to make Math and Science learning exciting for students. This is done by helping teachers come up with strategies and activities to make Math and Science lessons fun. The soft programs also included the creation of avenues where teachers and students can process their difficult experiences. This included creative writing workshops and healing through the arts sessions. Programa Genio is also helping in improving the schools' resource centers by providing quality reference materials for all grade levels. PG also set up a "Teacher's Corner" which houses materials for teachers. Finally, PG initiated the development of a Reading Center for the schools.

In 2015, Programa Genio was granted funding by UBS and AFI – US to implement educational soft programs to more schools in the Yolanda affected areas. Programa Genio



utilized the funds to introduce the **Assessment for Diverse Learners**. The assessment aims to formally determine the actual skills and levels of students in Grade 3 to Grade 6 and to give the appropriate intervention especially for "gifted" children and children with special needs. To address issues on absenteeism, non - participation in class activities and the failure to understand academic concepts because of hunger, a feeding program was implemented for students who come to school hungry daily even if they are not malnourished. Technological equipment (i.e. computers, LCD projectors etc.) were also provided based on the standards set by the Department of Education to help enhance the teaching and learning experience in the schools and respond to the challenge of making quality education accessible to all.

Aside from student - centered interventions, Program Genio also helped the teachers become

better facilitators of learning by providing them with seminars and training. The seminars and training provided to the teachers enabled them to have a better understanding of the K to 12 curriculum, increased the number of creative ways that they can deliver the lessons, helped in creating better tools to assess their students' learning and assisted them on how to utilize and integrate technology in teaching.

PROGRAMA GENIO – UBS



Believing in the capability of Programa Genio to effect change in the lives of students in the Yolanda affected areas, UBS, a global financial services firm, partnered with the program in implementing soft educational programs in three elementary schools in Samar and a secondary school in Leyte where ALKFI – Sagip Kapamilya is the development sponsor. The beneficiary schools were Basiao Elementary School, Pagsulhogon Elementary School, Osmeña Elementary School and Dulag National High School. Programa Genio implemented ten educational interventions across the four schools. A total of 3,623 students and 144 teachers benefitted from the partnership.

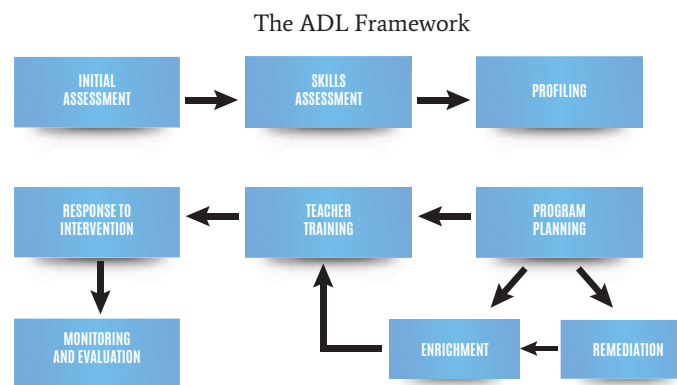
ASSESSMENT OF DIVERSE LEARNERS

The Assessment of Diverse Learners (ADL) is the preparatory phase in the development of educational programs that can build on student strengths. This is the real spirit of inclusive education in which the new K-12 curriculum is anchored on. It is a two pronged program focusing on the identification of the Gifted and Children with Special Educational Needs (CSEN).

The ADL has two goals:

- For CSEN, to become independent members of the community.
- For the gifted, to be molded as the country's leaders in many different ways in order to contribute to the nation's development.

Identification and conducting assessments for gifted children is important because gifted education provides balance between excellence and equity. This means providing high standards of education for all but ensuring that this is readily available and faster for those from disadvantaged backgrounds. Through combined support for excellence and equity, the Philippines can significantly increase high quality human capital to improve economic growth. A contributing gifted sector can have a significant impact on national economy.

FEEDING MIRACLE

Miracle is a grade three student in Osmeña Elementary School. During Typhoon Yolanda, her family was displaced from Eastern Samar. She is currently living with her aunt in Marabut, Samar. Her father is a chainsaw operator and her mother does not have a job.

At a young age, Miracle knows what it means to be hungry. Because of lack of money, her parents cannot afford to buy food for the whole family. Miracle is a smart kid but she often comes to school glassy eyed because of hunger.

Pagkaing Genio was a huge blessing to Miracle. It ensured that she will have at least one decent meal every day. The feeding program became a lifeline to her as she does not expect to have food at home. During class, her teachers observed her to be more attentive, participative and energetic.

At the end of the feeding program, Miracle is healthier, has higher grades and has a healthy smile.

Like Miracle, Pagkaing Genio has been a boon to 600 other children in the three elementary schools that are beneficiaries of the UBS grant. At the start of the program 156 out of the 600 students are found to be malnourished and low performing. At the end of the feeding program, this number has been reduced to 48 students.

TEACHER TRAINING

120 teachers from the four UBS beneficiary schools benefitted from the four training sessions held by Programa Genio in 2015. 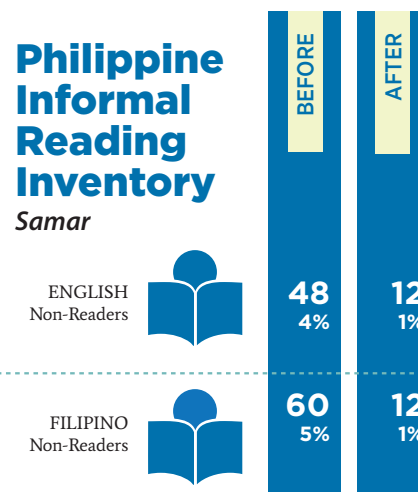

LIBRARY DEVELOPMENT

UBS and Program Genio refurbished the libraries and resource centers of the four beneficiary schools. A total of 3,623 students and 144 teachers benefitted from this intervention. By the end of the school year, the Philippine Informal Reading Inventory assessment yielded encouraging results. From the 1,207 students assessed, the number of English non-readers across all schools decreased from 4% to 1%. Likewise, the number of Filipino non-readers decreased from 5% to 1%.



The rehabilitated libraries sparked the interest among the students to read. Slowly but surely, the habit of reading is also being developed among the students. The libraries were also able to provide materials for the students’ research needs.

COMPUTER AND SCIENCE LABORATORY

The UBS – Programa Genio partnership also gifted Dulag National High School with 25 computers sets for their computer laboratory and laboratory equipment for their science laboratory. Also, a computer set was turned over to the faculty of the three beneficiary elementary schools under the partnership.

The computer sets were given to facilitate better learning for students and for teachers to have an easier time in doing their reportorial requirements. Program Genio also tapped Information Technology experts from ABS-CBN Network who gave an Information and Communication (ICT) Training to the teachers.

The laboratory equipment donated for the science laboratory brought to life and fun to science students as they are able to witness firsthand the chemical reactions and have hands on experiences on conducting experiments. The actual laboratory activities generated a significant interest and appreciation of Science concepts.

MURAL OF HOPE

The Mural of Hope is a testament that hope has been rekindled and that students can again dream and achieve their goals in life. It is a reminder to the students that the path towards a brighter future is once again lit and is within reach. The mural contains the aspirations and hope of the students as they collaborated and assisted an artist in doing the art work.

STORY TELLING WORKSHOP

Effective storytelling is a fine and beautiful art. A well-developed and presented story can cut across age barriers and will hold the interest and reach its listeners. A manual by Barry McWilliams which enumerated effective storytelling techniques served as guide to the facilitator- Mr. Erwin Felipe of Programa Genio, in choosing the story to tell to the schoolchildren of Basiao Elementary School (Basey, Samar), Osmeña Elementary School (Marabut, Samar), and Pagsulhogon Elementary School (Santa Rita, Samar).



HEALING THROUGH THE ARTS

Programa Genio's assessment showed that psychologically, elementary school students experienced the worst trauma during Typhoon Yolanda. The Healing Through the Arts Program was introduced to provide a venue for these children to process difficult experiences through various art forms. Art was also used as a platform to develop the creativity of the children through the different activities in school.

Under the tutelage of Program Genio's Program Director, Teacher Maricar Estole, all the students of the three elementary schools under the PG-UBS partnership joined the art workshops.

Some children proudly showed up their work during the workshop. The drawings were not just simple and beautiful artwork but they carry with them the dreams and the feelings of each of the participants.



James said this was one of the happiest days of his life. He has never experienced painting in canvass.

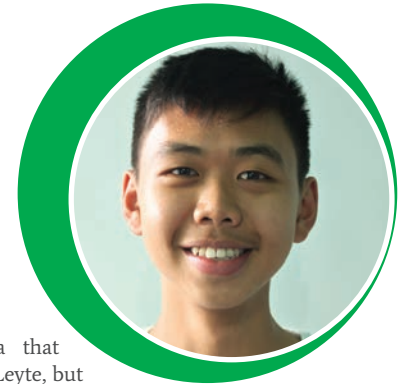

PROGRAMA GENIO – AFI U.S.

The AFI-US grant for Programa Genio covered 11 schools in two municipalities in Eastern Samar. These municipalities were also aided by Sagip Kapamilya even if ALKFI – Sagip Kapamilya was not designated as the area development sponsor for these towns. In 2015, Programa Genio's initial projects include Library Development in all 11 schools that currently benefits 2,086 students. Teacher training about the K-12 Curriculum, loving and teaching reading, and reading comprehension instruction was done to lay the foundation for future soft education interventions. The trainings benefitted 75 teachers from the beneficiary schools.

In 2009, ALKFI through its Bayanijuan (BNJ) Program had just established a presence in Southville 7 to oversee its first wave of informal settler families (ISFs) affected by the rehabilitation of the Pasig River, which was a joint project between ALKFI, under Kapit Bisig Para Sa Ilog Pasig, and the Pasig River Rehabilitation Commission (PRRC). The original plan was to relocate around 1,000 informal settler families that lived in the banks of the esteros. With the help of generous donors and benefactors, BNJ would orchestrate the synergizing of all of ALKFI's community outreach and development programs (i.e. Bantay Bata, Programa Genio (formerly E-Media), Bantay Kalikasan, Sagip Kapamilya and Kapit Bisig Para sa Ilog Pasig). The goal was to build a model community that would significantly transform the lives of 1,000 families. This will be done by giving them what they need to start a new chapter and teaching them the

necessities in order to have a better quality of life than the one they had in the esteros.

When Typhoon Ondoy devastated Metro Manila, the National Housing Authority (NHA) was directed to open the doors of Southville 7 to 3,000 families from cities of Pasig and Marikina that were displaced by the floods. Nobody was prepared for the consequence of the disaster. It was never in Bayanijuan's masterplan to add, within the same year, that huge number of families to its planned model community. Moreover, local government does not enough resources to accommodate more families that were affected by Ondoy. The resettlement site also lacks infrastructure for electricity and water for the growing Southville 7 population.

Despite the challenges, Bayanijuan remained undaunted. Tapping the spirit of bayanihan, ALKFI invited development partners such as Lopez Group of Companies, Ayala Foundation and Habitat for Humanity Philippines to help the organization develop the resettlement site. These partners also brought friends from Salesians of Saint John Bosco, Consuelo Foundation and Life Project 4 Youth to help improve the delivery of public services in child care, livelihood and values formation. These programs complemented the resources provided by the local government and national government agencies. "Walang iwanan sa Bayanijuan" was very much alive in the collaboration of organizations, people, companies, and institutions that have come to Southville 7 to extend help.



In 2012, the Japan Fund for Poverty Reduction, through the Asian Development Bank, awarded \$1.5 million to the National Housing Authority for the implementation of the grant project, Promoting Partnerships and Innovation in Poor and Underserved Communities. The grant implementation was coursed through ALKFI-BNJ, serving as the project's Implementing Agency. The project has four components: piloting a program for expanding multi-sector partnerships; implementing a community development and innovation program; enhancing capacities of residents in community development and social entrepreneurship; and establishing a project management, monitoring

and evaluation, and reporting system. Community integration and organization are crucial to the success of the resettlement site.

In 2014, Typhoon Glenda destroyed dozens of houses of Southville 7 residents, many of whom were survivors of Typhoon Ondoy in 2009. .. BNJ, Habitat for Humanity Philippines and various donors have committed to rebuild the damaged houses and communities facilities. NHA and the local government of Calauan, meanwhile, provided construction materials to help families fix their houses. Structural improvements were introduced in the repair works, to ensure units sustain no or minimal damage in future weather disturbances.

As of December 2015, 1,613 out of 5,659 houses, or 28%, have been energized, through funding from the ADB-JFPR grant, NHA and the local government of Calauan. This was a 12% increase from December 2014, which only had 903 houses. Access to clean water also improved with 79% of households (4,487 out of 5,659) connected to at least Level 2 water facilities, from 62% (3,504 out of 5,659) in December 2014. Echoing the concept of empowerment or “may kakayanan,” community-based organizations have set in planning and budget sessions of the local government to ensure that Southville 7 is incorporated in its local development plan.

PROJECTS

ASIAN DEVELOPMENT BANK– JAPAN FUND FOR POVERTY REDUCTION (ADB–JFPR)

BNJ is on track in implementing the projects under the ADB-JFPR grant. In the review mission conducted in November 2015, ADB reported that the implementation of projects under the grant is on track, with the physical progress estimated at 79.8% as of 30 September 2015. As of November 2015, cumulative contract awards and disbursements are \$1.1 million (75.2%) and \$1.1 million (75.2%), respectively. The project implementation was extended for 12 months to May 2016 due to delays caused by Typhoon Glenda in 2014. The projects under the ADB-JFPR grant include electrification, access to potable water, livelihood, and capacity building in community development and social entrepreneurship.

COMMUNITY INNOVATION FUND

Bayanijuan marked the second year of implementing the Community Innovation Fund (CIF) by recognizing “good paying” beneficiaries for their timely repayments and credit discipline. Thirty-six residents were handed grocery gift certificates during the “Araw ng Parangal para sa mga Natatanging Negosyante ng Community Innovation Fund” (Recognition Day for Exceptional Entrepreneurs of the Community Innovation Fund) in November 2015. Funded by the Asian Development Bank (ADB) and the Japan Fund for Poverty Reduction (JFPR), the CIF is an interest-free loan project that seeks to support small enterprises in Southville 7. The fund is managed by ABS-CBN Lingkod Kapamilya Foundation, Bayan EDGE (Enterprise Developers, Growers and Evolvers), and the Bayanijuan Producers Association (BNJPA). By the end of 2015, PHP 6.48 million in zero-interest loans have been released to 619 beneficiaries. More than half of those loan releases, or PHP 3.4 million, have been collected and will serve as capital for future socio-economic projects of BNJPA.

Lea Nabor, a market vendor and a Typhoon Ondoy survivor, received PHP 10,000 worth of grocery, won the top prize amounting to PHP 10,000 worth of grocery gift certificates. Nabor said maintaining the trust of her clients is key to her business’ success.

“Ayaw ko po magpaliban (ang pagbabayad) kahit ano (ang mangyari). Pinaglalaanan ko po talaga iyon dahil ayaw ko na masira sa pinag-uutangan ko. Para sa akin kapag ganitong mahirap lang tayo, dignidad na lang ang meron tayo di ba? Kailangan nating pagsumikapan na hindi hindi tayo masira sa kausap natin.”



COMMUNITY-MANAGED POTABLE WATER SYSTEM

Jaime Sapitanan is a resident of Site 1 of Southville 7. He recalls that before the Water Consortium in Site 1 was put in place, he had to walk approximately one kilometer and endured long lines just to get drinking water for himself and his family. Some 2,800 families in Site 1 share this plight and is a required daily pilgrimage for them if they are to drink clean water. Mang Jaime admitted that aside from the physical burden, the knowledge that FirstVille residents who are part of the consortium earn money while Site 1 residents are barely making ends meet elicits a negative feeling.

When Mang Jaime heard that ADB-JFPR will fund the setting up of communal water stations in Site 1 he was ecstatic. The ADB – JFPR grant allowed for the construction of a water station in each of the five Homeowner's Association (HOA) in Site 1. Mang Jaime left a higher paying position in another water group and joined the new consortium in Site 1. Since the consortium was on its early stages then, there was no certainty of payment despite the services rendered and if there was any, it was very meager. Buoyed by a genuine love and concern for his co-residents in Site 1, Mang Jaime was not disheartened by the conditions and gave all that he could to improve the conditions of the project and the consortium. He started as a maintenance worker and he jokingly shared that his experience in maintaining the pipes and water network taught him the meaning of system loss. During the early stages of the consortium, one of the main challenges is how to deal with water lost from unmonitored leaking pipes and faucets and spillage because of delay in closing the communal faucets. To minimize the loss, the consortium became more vigilant in monitoring

for leaks. Old and leaking pipes were immediately replaced and the water station stewards were trained to be more conscious of spillage. This led to increased net profits and savings for future maintenance or pipe replacements, and increased HOA profit share. The pay for the workers is still minimal but there is hope that it will increase in the future.

Mang Jaime shared that the water consortium has great impact in the lives of residents in Site 1. The most obvious is that people no longer need to walk far and wait in line for long just to have drinking water. In terms of livelihood, the communal water project directly created 22 jobs for people in Site 1, majority of which are women. It also created new livelihood opportunities for the residents because they are able to sell ice products. The consortium is also able to contribute to HOA's operational funds, which may be used in future community projects.

In the last election of officers for the Water Consortium, Mang Jaime was elected as the new President. One of the significant challenges that he needs to address is teaching the water station stewards to be honest and practice integrity in handling their collections. He also stresses the importance of consistency in recording of payments. Mang Jaime hopes that the water consortium will soon become ready for upgrading their water system to Level 3, which offers direct water connection to households in their area.



The pilot PPP Project for Level II water system in BNJ Site 1 has finished its construction in March 2015 and has been operational since May 2015. Five HOA water groups each operate one or two communal water stations. These water groups are under the joint supervision of ALKFI and a HOA Water Consortium which is comprised of representatives from each of the five HOAs. The water system now serves approximately 2,300 households in Site 1.

REKINDLING A BRIGHTER LIGHT IN SOUTHVILLE 7

A BRIGHTER SUNSHINE IN SOUTHVILLE 7

The partnership of ABS-CBN Lingkod Kapamilya Foundation's BayaniJuan and Sun Life Financial now includes more than just providing shelter to the residents of the community of Southville 7. Sun Life also funded community facilities such as a community center, learning center, rainwater harvesters and water pumps. Moreover, it supported Itikan ni Inay – a small enterprise composed of 10 mothers involved in the production of salted duck eggs.

Sun Life's adopted community, also known as Legacy of Light Village was hit by Typhoon 'Glenda' in July 2014, destroying many of the Panibahay units, as well as the learning center and gymnasium. Despite the disaster, Legacy of Life residents showed solidarity with their neighbors by offering to adopt affected families until the houses were repaired. Other families, meanwhile, temporarily transferred to vacant units in Site 2, where they were welcomed by the Humanityville Homeowners Association

EVERYTHING IS BRIGHT AND RIGHT

From a group of 10 mothers, Itikan ni Inay has expanded its operations to accommodate 20 more people. The original Itikan ni Inay group, together with Dr. Rene Santiago of the National Swine and Poultry Research Center, shared their know-how to raise ducks and to prepare salted ducks. The enterprise also transferred its duck farm from a rented property in Barangay Wakat to a bigger 1,000-sqm lot inside an Ayala-developed agricultural park. The new duck farm is now home to 1,300 ducks. Wilma Vibar, one of Itikan ni Inay's members, said they are also excited about producing balut using duck eggs.

ALKFI and Panibahay brainchild Architect Edgar Reformado revisited the design of the Panibahay to improve the structural integrity of the housing units. The modified design was applied in the reconstruction, which was completed in December 2015. The Alternative Learning Center, meanwhile, had minor repairs done in November 2014. Finally, the reconstruction of the Community Center will be finished in December this year.

In addition to community facilities and livelihood assistance, Sun Life Foundation also supported the continuing education of 17 children under the Bantay Edukasyon project of Bantay Bata 163. These scholars, together with their parents, attend regular meetings conducted ALKFI to track their progress in school.

Company executives of Sun Life Financial recently visited Southville 7 in November 2015 to exchange stories with residents of Legacy of Life Village. Joining the visit were Sun Life Financial Canada-Philippines president and CEO Riza Mantaring, Sun Life Financial president and CEO Dean Connor, Sun Life Financial Asia president Kevin Strain and Sun Life Financial Asia vice president Roger Steel.

ALKFI Chairman Gina Lopez told Sun Life, "I feel that in each and every investment that we have funded here, through you, many lives will change and we're like lighting a flame where that's gonna go far beyond the immediate peripheral. And I need to say, this is a good way to do CSR."

Ms. Mantaring shared that it was indeed a fulfillment on their part seeing the lives of the people of Southville 7 change because of what they have done. "Seeing their future become brighter and more secure, the impact is tremendously fulfilling for us. I think for the people who live here, it has also made a difference to their lives," she said.

Indeed, the sun does not stop shining in the Legacy of Light Village in Southville 7 and each day just gets even brighter.





UNIQLO EMPOWERS WOMEN THROUGH LINGKOD KAPAMILYA

Committed to empower women, Uniqlo seals the agreement with ABS-CBN Lingkod Kapamilya Foundation to give livelihood to the women of the community in Southville 7 Calauan, Laguna.

Under the partnership are two projects called “Upcycling” and “Recycling”. In Upcycling, Uniqlo will donate scrap denim materials to ALKFI-BayaNiJuan, a program that caters the community of Southville 7. The sewers of the community will conceptualize, design, and create new items out of the given materials which will be bought by Uniqlo to be used as their corporate giveaways. The clothing brand will also provide trainings to

the group to ensure a steady supply of skilled workers.

For the past five years, Uniqlo has been placing recycling boxes in each of their stores where customers can donate their clothes that they no longer want to use. The collected clothes will be donated to ALKFI, to be used by ALKFI’s different program to their community outreach projects and other related activities.

Geraldine Sia, Uniqlo’s General Manager beams, “What Uniqlo and ABS-CBN Lingkod Kapamilya Foundation have in common, is we are able to provide dignity for people. Aside from that, particularly for this BayaNiJuan project, is for us to equip women, for them to have this livelihood, for them to learn, and that they themselves will also grow from this kind of work and training.”

ING BIKE PROJECT FOR LIVELIHOOD AND MOBILITY

ING Foundation has given ten (10) pedicabs to selected Southville 7 residents under its Bike Project for Livelihood and Mobility. The project was aimed at improving self-employed businesses through environment-friendly means of transport. To encourage ownership in the project, beneficiaries were required to pay 20% of the pedicab's value to the Humanityville Homeowners Association, which in turn, may use the repayments as part of the latter's community fund. ING Foundation plans to give another 10 pedicab units to another set of beneficiaries in 2016.

INSTITUTIONAL TRANSITION FOR SOUTHVILLE 7

As part of the ongoing process of preparing community-based organizations and government agencies in the eventual turnover of Southville 7, ALKFI has initiated the review of its Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) with the National Housing Authority. Under the MOA, NHA has authorized ALKFI to serve as project manager of Southville 7 from 2009 to 2019, as well as implement service delivery projects in health, education, environment and community development, among others. Cost-saving initiatives such as the turnover of solid waste management, Bantay Bayan mobilization and daycare operations were also discussed with the local government of Calauan, taking effect in 2016.



KAPAMILYA KONEK

With the help of the different ABS-CBN Broadcasting platforms, Kapamilya Konek was able to have a global presence reaching as many as two million Filipinos in Canada, North America, Europe, Middle East, and the Asia Pacific. This allowed the radio program to expand its core mission from assisting and connecting families locally to helping Overseas Filipino Workers (OFWs) strengthen their bond with their families who are left at home.

Kapamilya Konek (KK) is a one hour radio program that started in April 2013 as a replacement to Bago Yan Ah!, a Science and Technology program that ALKFI produced and ran for 16 years. Kapamilya Konek is ALKFI's response to ABS-CBN Network's call of producing quality and family oriented and centered shows. The program aims to connect family members by providing advice from experts on various family problems and issues.



For the past two years, the profile of listeners has not changed – women whose age range from 25 – 40 years old. Kapamilya Konek has consistently helped in boosting the Sunday afternoon block ratings with its avid following.

Kapamilya Konek was introduced globally through The Filipino Channel (TFC) which has over two million subscribers worldwide. Since most of the viewers of the program overseas are also Filipinos, Kapamilya Konek has expanded its program segments to cater to Overseas Filipino Workers (OFWs) who want to connect with their families in the Philippines. KK also helps aspiring OFWs land potential jobs abroad by discussing their aspirations and helping them with their employment concerns.

The program segments include:

PAYONG KAPAMILYA – on air counseling on diverse family issues with the help of an expert/guidance counselor

KAPAMILYA ABROAD - strengthening families by connecting them to their Kapamilyas abroad and helping OFWs with employment issues.

KALUSUGAN KONEK – features holistic health, wellness and nutrition for the family.

LINGKOD KAPAMILYA KONEK (semi regular) - platform for different ALKFI programs to promote their advocacies.

For two years now, Kapamilya Konek has won the best Radio Magazine Program in Kapisanan ng mga Brodkaster ng Pilipinas (KBP) Golden



Dove Awards. The program is being anchored by a tandem of experienced mothers – ABS-CBN Senior Correspondent Jing Castañeda and Human Resource Expert and ALKFI's Managing Director Susan B. Afan.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.




Opinion
